Service Volumes Not Within Corridor

Canadian Hearing Services (CHS) did not meet the performance corridor for individuals (-9% variance from bottom of corridor) or visits (-7%) due to a few factors:

- the COVID-19 shutdown
- GSS was functioning with a waitlist, and has recently hired a new staff person to augment service.
- The counties outside London also have significant competition for hearing health services.
 Upon reopening after COVID-19, hearing screenings and health fairs will help rectify the shortfall.
